Manfred – an allusion to a dramatic poem written by Lord Byron in 1816 featuring an eccentric lord living as a recluse in the Alps, convinced he has committed some unpardonable sin connected to his beloved Astarte.

Lord Ruthwen – from *The Vampire* by John William Polidori, Lord Ruthwen is a villain who gambles and gives his winnings to impoverished people with vices.

Vocabulary

libel - a false statement that has been published that is damaging to a person's reputation

So curious that it seems to me you're running the risk of being sued for *libel*.

indomitable - impossible to defeat

He had to collect the documents he had been amassing for a long time in order to enable him to ward off this storm, which his wily and **indomitable** character had foreseen.

approbation – approval or praise

A murmur of *approbation* arose from the assembly.

sonority - a full, rich, and pleasant sound

... replied the young woman in a voice full of captivating sadness and impregnated with that **sonority** peculiar to Oriental voices.

imperturbably - unable to be upset

"Probably," said the Count *imperturbably*.
